### Orange Street brick pavers did not meet city standards

By CHANTAL M. LOVELL Staff Writer REDLANDS — Improvements made to

downtown streets last summer will have to be redone due to failing work and quality that does not meet city standards. City Spokesman Carl Baker said all of

the brick intersections installed at downtown intersections less than one year ago are falling apart, and do not meet the quality standards specified in the agreement with contractor All-American Asphalt.

"Once the initial construction was complete, the bricks started to settle and were not flat," Baker said. "You can feel it when you drive over them. When we went back and tested the bricks, we found they did not meet the durability standards speci-

Work was originally scheduled to begin Saturday, but has been postponed at least two weeks due to the possibility of rain Sunday and Monday, Baker said

Baker said All-American Asphalt was notified of the problem immediately and will need to replace all the brick pavers, at no cost to the city, installed in the intersections on Orange Street at Pearl Avenue, Stuart Avenue, Shoppers Lane, Redlands Boulevard and State Street.

But the road closures to allow for the corrective work have some local businesses concerned it will affect sales in an already struggling economic environ-

#### **Fixing Orange Street**

The city has met with contractors who performed resurfacing work on Orange Street last summer, and work to correct deficiencies in the brick-paved intersections along the street is set to begin in two weeks.



PHASE 1: Intersection of Orange Street and State Street. Orange Street will be closed between Citrus Avenue and Redlands Boulevard, and State Street will be closed from Orange to Fifth Street.

■ PHASE 2: Northbound intersections of Shoppers Lane, Stuart Avenue and Pearl Avenue. Northbound lanes of Orange Street will be closed. One lane of traffic in each direction will be provided in the southbound lanes of Orange Stre

■ PHASE 3: Northbound intersection of Orange Street at Redlands Boulevard. Northbound lanes of Orange Street will be closed, as well as Redlands Boulevard, between Orange Street and Fifth Street. One lane of traffic in each direction will be provided in the southbound lanes of Orange Street.

PHASE 4: Southbound intersection of Orange Street at Redlands Boulevard. Southbound lanes of Orange Street will be closed, as well as Redlands Boulevard between Orange Street and Eureka Street. One lane of traffic in each direction will be provided in the northbound lanes of Orange Street.

PHASE 5: Southbound intersections of Shoppers Lane, Stuart Avenue and Pearl Avenue. Southbound lanes of Orange Street will be closed. One lane of traffic in each direction will be provided in the northbound lanes of Orange Street.

## **Husing** shares state of region

Economist offers criticisms, ideas

ONTARIO - John Husing, who has for years taken on the role of the Inland Empire's unofficial economic spokesman, mixed strong criticisms of the region's status quo with a call Thursday for the area's private- and public-sector leaders to come together to reverse the region's economic slide.

"We are in the bull's-eye of the mortgage crisis, and it is going to take us a long way to work out of that," said Husing, who framed his remarks as "the most complicated speech I've ever given to a meeting like this.'

While delivering his "State of the Region" speech, Husing offered myriad criticisms and proposals on subjects ranging from education, the effects of environmental regulation on blue-collar jobs, energy policy and the imperative to bring high-paying employers to the

Husing spoke to an audience of hundreds of business managers, politicos and nonprofit administrators at the Double-Tree Hotel Ontario.

The economist said his speech is the product of more than 120 interviews with business and civic leaders in San Bernardino and Riverside

Those conversations led Husing to conclude the field of education, particularly the Inland Empire's relative dearth of degree-holding adults, is the No. 1 source of problems the region's business leaders need to solve in order for the people of the Inland Empire to control their economic destinies.
